

OVERVIEW



EARLY WAIKIKI

1400s

Waikiki means "spouting water" was a marshland and popular gathering place for the O'ahu royal family.

Sometime this century, Chief Kalamakua built fishponds and designed a freshwater irrigation system that gradually transformed the marshland into taro fields, fishponds and gardens. Waikiki was once one of the most productive agricultural areas in Old Hawaii.

1809

King Kamehameha I moved his royal court to Waikiki and it was around this time that the Hawaiian Royalty was first observed riding longboards on Waikiki's famous waves.

HISTORIC WAVES

- In the early 1900s, work began on the Ala Wai
 Canal forever changing the land and the sea.
- From ancient times, Waikiki has been a popular surfing spot, once known for waves that broke at over 30 feet, nicknamed bluebirds.
- Duke Kahanamoku was known for surfing a 30 feet wave for one mile.
- But now that the Ala Wai diverts all the water, the ocean floor changed, resulting in the disappearance of certain surf spots and those historic waves.

ALA WAI CANAL

1900s

Ala Wai (freshwater way) Canal was at the heart of the Waikiki Reclamation Project launched in the early 1900's to reclaim an unsanitary and most unsightly portion of the city.

1920s

Waikiki landscape undergoes a dramatic re-development ushering in a new age of urbanization for Waikiki.

1928

With the canal's completion in 1928, the taro and rice fields all vanished.

1930s

The reclaimed areas turned into the house lots which eventually turned into apartments, stores, restaurants, hotels – and one of the world's greatest destination areas.

TRANSPORTATION

1860s • First roads were constructed.

This roads were constructed

1888 Animal-powered tramcar service of Hawaiian Tramways ran track from downtown to Waikiki.

1902 Electric trolley built to connect Waikiki and downtown Waikiki. The electric trolley replaced horse-driven tram cars.

1941 • Electric street cars (trolleys) cease operation.









KAPIOLANI PARK HORSE TRACK/POLO FIELD

1877

Kapiolani Park built in for horse racing. In the center of the park was a racetrack for horses.

1880

Polo field was established in the middle of the racetrack as well and polo flourished.

1950s- ● 1960s In the 1950s, Honolulu was growing, and the forces of urbanization were pushing hard against keeping polo and the adjacent public stables in Kapiolani Park. By the early 1960s the stables were torn down and polo in the park was history.

DILLINGHAM FOUNTAIN

1919

The Phoenix Fountain was a replica of a fountain in Japan gifted by Hawaii's Japanese people in commemoration of the coronation of Emperor Yoshihito of Japan and was later removed in 1943.

1967

Walter and Louise Dillingham Foundation donates fountain in memory of Louise G. Dillingham, who served on the Department of Parks and Recreation Board from 1931 until 1964. Her husband Walter Dillingham was instrumental in spearheading changes to Honolulu's landscape, including dredging the Ala Wai Canal and draining and filling-in Waikiki's wetlands.


Dillingham Fountain has become a popular resting spot for joggers and backdrop for photos.





INTERNATIONAL MARKET PLACE

- First opened in 1956 as a commercial, retail and entertainment center.
- Waikiki Village, the predecessor of International Market Place, was created by Donn Beach with the goal of building a series of little "villages" with unique shops and cart vendors selling Polynesian-themed trinkets.
- Tourist boom of the 1960s propelled Waikiki's popularity,
 Waikiki Village evolved into International Market Place.
- The original International Market Place was a legendary shopping destination attracting visitors from all over the world not only for the shopping but the area's entertainment and surfing celebrities.





FORT DERUSSY

- All of today's Fort DeRussy on the mauka side of the Kalia Road was covered with fishponds.
- US military acquired 72 acres of land from Chinese millionaire Chun Afong for \$28,000 and started draining it in 1908 to build Fort DeRussy named after General Rene Edward DeRussy.
- Battery Randolph within Fort DeRussy was built in 1911 to defend Pearl Harbor and Honolulu from attack.
- Today, Fort DeRussy Armed Forces Recreation Center is the home of the Hale Koa Hotel (House of the Warrior) and continued favorite R&R destination for our country's military personnel and the US Army Museum of Hawai'i (Battery Randolph).







HAWAIIAN VILLAGE HOTEL

1957

Henry Kaiser opens the Hawaiian Village Hotel, which includes guest cottages and the Kaiser Aluminum Dome.

1961

Hilton Hotels & Resorts assumed management on February 1, 1961, renaming the resort the Hilton Hawaiian Village

1968

Resort's iconic Rainbow Tower opened, with the world's largest and tallest ceramic tile mosaic on its facade, an image of a rainbow measuring 26 feet wide and 286 feet tall, which required over 16,000 individual tiles.







HILTON HAWAIIAN VILLAGE

- Two-sided Rainbow Mural was known as the World's Tallest Mosaic when it was first revealed in 1968
- Hilton Hawaiian Village has been featured in multiple television shows, including Hawaiian Eye, Wheel of Fortune, Baywatch, Hawaii Five-0
- World-renowned Blue Hawaii cocktail invented in 1957 by Hilton bartender Harry Yee.
- Hilton Hawaiian Village was the setting for Elvis Presley's movie "Blue Hawaii"














ILIKAI HOTEL

- Ilikai Hotel opens in 1964 as first luxury high rise hotel in Hawaii with a total of 1050 units.
- Ilikai Hotel developed by Chinn Ho. Originally, building was intended to exclusively house 1056 apartment units but eventually re-imagined as a complex with 509 condominium units and 504 hotel rooms.
- Opening credits of Hawaii Five-0 make Ilikai Hotel an icon.




Waikiki Condos: Annual Sales Apartment vs. Resort Zoning



 Average share of Waikiki cash buyers has grown since the end of the subprime mortgage crisis.




Waikiki Condo Sales: Average Percent Share of Cash Buyers by Time Period and Zoning
